Census: Age and Sex

— 2006 Census —

Statistics Canada today released age and sex statistics from the 2006 census. The national census is conducted every five years, primarily to count all persons and dwellings in Canada. In the Northwest Territories the census was undertaken in March and May of 2006. This report presents the second of a series of releases based on the 2006 census results.

A few of the highlights for the Northwest Territories from the age and sex release include:

- The NWT is the second youngest jurisdiction in Canada, behind Nunavut, with almost 1 in 4 people being under 15 years of age in 2006
- Between 1991 and 2006, the proportion of persons aged less than 15 years declined from 29.0% to 23.9%, while over this same period the proportion of persons aged 65 years and older increased from 3.2% to 4.8%


The population count for Northwest Territories was 41,464 persons at the time of the 2006 census. The distribution across age categories for the NWT shows that in 2006, 23.9% of the population was under 15 years of age; 71.3% was of working age (15-64); and 4.8% of the population was 65 years of age and older. Nunavut, with almost 40% of its population under 15 years of age was the youngest jurisdiction in 2006, while Saskatchewan had the highest proportion of persons 65 years of age and older (15.4%), making it the oldest jurisdiction. Saskatchewan, at 4.9%, also had the highest proportion of persons 80 years and older.

On a gender basis, the population distributions are evenly split among males and females in the NWT. On an aggregate basis, the ratio of males per 100 females was 104.9 in 2006. Which is down from 109.6 in 1991 and 106.6 in 1996. The Canadian average in 2006 was 95.9 males per 100 females.

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Chart 2 Population Age Pyramid (Inukshuk) Northwest Territories, 2006 Males and females





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With regard to the changing age structure of the NWT population, between 1991 and 2006, the proportion of persons aged less than 15 years declined from 29.0% to 23.9%, while over this same period the proportion of persons aged 65 years and older increased from 3.2% to 4.8%.

One additional notable change in age structure was the significant increase in the 45 to 54 age group, which increased from 8.4% of the total population to 14.8% between 1991 and 2006.

On a community basis, Colville Lake has the youngest population, with 44.0% of the population aged less than 15 years, with Gamètì having the second youngest at 35.1%. Yellowknife at 21.5% has the lowest overall proportion of its population in the under 15 category.

Norman Wells had the lowest proportion of population 65 years and over at 2.0%, followed by Yellowknife at 2.5%. Kakisa, at 18.2%, had the highest proportion of its population aged 65 years and older.
