



Monthly Labour Force Activity – March 2017-

Overview

The employment rate in the Northwest Territories was 66.0% in March, up from 65.3% in February. Out of 32,400 residents 15 years of age and older, 21,400 were employed, an increase of 300 persons from the previous month. Employment increases from last month were concentrated in full-time positions, among males and persons aged 25 and over.

Compared to this time last year, there were 1,000 fewer people employed in the NWT. Most of the job losses were in full-time positions.

Employment rates during the first three months of 2017 stayed below 67%, making them the lowest in seven years for this period of the year.


Year-over-year, unemployment dropped by 200 persons to 1,600 in March 2017. Consequently, the unemployment rate

dropped 0.4 percentage points to 7.0% during the same period.

National highlights

Nationally, Canada's monthly employment rate dropped to 60.9%. Yukon (73.9%) had the highest employment rate followed by the Northwest Territories and Alberta, both at 66.0%.

The NWT's unemployment rate was unchanged from last month, and stayed seventh highest in the country at 7.0%.



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Employment by key characteristics

Table 1 gives month-over-month and year-over-year comparisons of employment levels and employment rates by key characteristics. In March 2017, the overall employment for most of the key characteristics was lower than the previous year. The exceptions were for Aboriginal persons where employment increased slightly, and for persons living outside of Yellowknife where employment levels were unchanged from last year.

In March 2017, 500 more females than males were employed. This is a change from 12 months ago when employment levels were the same for males and females. This change was a result of higher year-over-year job losses among males than females.



Employment by industry

The decline by 1,300 in private sector employment between March 2016 and March 2017 more than off-set marginal gains in public sector (+100) and in selfemployment (+200).

Private sector employment has stayed below public sector employment for 11 consecutive months to March 2017. The previous longest stretch lasted three months back in 2001.
