Labour Market Activity

— 2006 Census —

Statistics Canada today released information on Labour Market Activity, Education, and Language of Work from the 2006 census. The national census is conducted every five years, primarily to count all persons and dwellings in Canada. In the Northwest Territories, the census was undertaken in March and May of 2006. This report presents the sixth in a series of releases based on the 2006 census results.

A few of the highlights for the Northwest Territories from the release include:

- The NWT participation rate was 76.5% in 2006, the second highest in Canada.
- NWT had the second youngest labour force in Canada, with a median age of 39.0 years
- The overall level of employment in the NWT reached 21,350 in 2006, with an employment rate of 68.6%.
- The largest industry employers in 2006 were Public Administration at 4,650 (21.8%), Retail Trade at 2,045 (9.6%), and Health Care and Social Assistance at 2,000 (9.4%).

Table 1 presents a breakdown of key labour market statistics by province and territory. The NWT, after Alberta and Yukon, had the third highest employment rate at 68.6%. In terms of unemployment rate, the NWT had the fourth highest rate at 10.4%, after Newfoundland, Nunavut and PEI.

2008-006 ISSN-0827-3545 Table 2 presents NWT community labour market statistics for 2006. There continues to be significant variation in employment rates across communities. While the NWT employment rate was 68.6%, the rate for Yellowknife was 79.3%, in the regional centres the rate was 71.2%, and in the rest of the communities the employment rate was 50.2%. The same pattern is seen with the unemployment rate, with a rate of 10.4% for the NWT, 5.7% for Yellowknife, 8.6% for the regional centres, and an unemployment rate of 21.3% for rest of the communities.

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Table 3 presents employment by industry detail for 2006. In 2006, the goods producing sector of the economy accounted for just over 16% in the NWT, while for the rest of Canada this sector accounted for 23.2%. The largest industry employers in 2006 in the NWT were Public Administration at 4,650 (21.8%), Retail Trade at 2,045 (9.6%), and Health Care and Social Assistance at 2,000 (9.4%).

Examining the median age (the age at which the employed population is divided in half) of the employed by industry shows that the median age is highest for agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting employees (44.0 years), and lowest for accommodation and food services employees (32.9 years).
