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Age & Sex and Type of Dwellings - 2016 Census -

Statistics Canada released age & sex and type of dwelling data from the 2016 Census – the second of a series of releases based on the 2016 Census results. The 2016 Census population count for NWT was 41,786 persons representing 21,280 males and 20,505 females for a sex ratio of 103.8 males per 100 females. By comparison, Canada had a sex ratio of 96.5 males per 100 females. That ratio decreased from 106.6 in 1996 for the NWT and was relatively unchanged at 96.2 for Canada.

The population pyramid in Figure 1 compares the age and sex distribution of the Northwest Territories (NWT) population over the last 20 years. In 2016, 0 to 19 year olds represented 28% of the population in the NWT, a decrease of 9 percentage points from 1996. The biggest population declines were seen in the age categories younger than 10 years. By contrast, those aged 50 and older showed the largest growth between 1996 and 2016. Many of these older age categories more than doubled in size and in total, currently comprise 28% of the population. Of the younger ages, 20 to 24 year old males were the only age category to exhibit any growth, increasing by over 10% to 1,670.

Figure 1 Population Age Pyramid by Sex Northwest Territories, 1996 – 2016







Figure 2 demonstrates historical population shares of seniors aged 65 and older compared to those under the age of 15. Seniors, as a proportion of the total population, have increased from 3.5% in 1996 to 7.7% in 2016, while the younger ages decreased from 29.0% to 21.2%.

Although the NWT population is aging, it remains one of the youngest in Canada. At 21%, the proportion of the population under 15 years of age was the second highest after Nunavut (32.5%). Nearing 20%, the Atlantic provinces had the highest proportion of seniors in Canada while at 71%, the NWT had the highest proportion in the working age group of 15 to 64 years (Table 2).

Table 3 shows the age distributions by community from the 2016 Census. In general, the communities outside of Yellowknife have a higher proportion of youth (less than 15 years old) and seniors (65+ years old). Thicho is the youngest region with 29.3% of its population younger than 15, while the South Slave region has the highest proportion of seniors at 11.4%. In the Yellowknife region, 74.3% are working age, between the ages of 15 to 64 years; this is the highest among all regions.

Notes: Statistics Canada employs a random rounding process for confidentiality. As a result, total may not be the exact sum. Information on Unorganized areas is suppressed, but included in the totals.



Statistics Canada also recently released information on types of dwellings. The data indicated that there were 15,045 dwellings occupied by usual residents in the NWT, which included 14,980 private dwellings and 65 collective dwellings. Nearly 58% of occupied dwellings in the NWT are single detached houses. Low-rise apartments represent 16% of dwellings and about 11% are row houses. The remainder of dwellings is a mix of semi-detached houses, apartments in taller buildings, and other dwelling types.

Other information from the 2016 Census such as marital status, income and education will be released by Statistics Canada later in the year. The next release will be August 2, 2017 on families, households and marital status as well as language.
