Income

- 2016 Census-

Statistics Canada has released information on income and earnings from the 2016 Census. This census release provides personal, family and household median income statistics by community and by various demographic groups.

At \$50,618, the Northwest Territories had the highest median personal income among the provinces and territories in 2015. Median income is the value where half of the population has an income above that amount and the other half of the population has an income below that amount. Median personal income grew in all jurisdictions between 2005 and 2015, with the NWT being one of six provinces and territories to see median personal income increase over 20% over the last ten years.

Income can be broken down into two basic sources: market income, which includes wages and salaries and government transfers. In the NWT, 92.6% of the total income was from market income in 2015, the second highest in Canada after Alberta. Government transfers comprised 7.4% of total income in the NWT.

Despite high median income in the NWT, there are variations by age categories and family type within the territory. Income tends to be higher for the working age population of 25 to 64 years of age, and lower for youth and seniors. When compared to Canada, median income for youth and seniors are closer to the Canadian median than the working age population (Chart 1).

Chart 2 shows median economic family income by family type. An economic family includes anyone who lives together and is related by blood, marriage or adoption. Family income tends to be higher in the NWT than Canada for all family types with the difference more pronounced for couple families. At \$156,490, couple family median income was 62% higher in the NWT than in Canada. For lone parent families, median family income was 35% higher in the NWT than in Canada. Other families in the NWT, for example, two single siblings living together, had median economic family income similar to lone parents.

Canada & Northwest Territories. 2





Chart 2: Median Economic Family Income

Despite high median family incomes in the NWT, 795 families earned less than \$30,000 in 2015. One in five (20.3%) lone parent families earned less than \$30,000 compared to 4.0% for couple families. Conversely, 73.6% of couple families and 35.1% of lone parent families earned \$100,000 or more in 2015.

At \$154,624 Norman Wells had the highest NWT median income in 2015, followed by Yellowknife (\$142,616). When comparing communities within NWT regions, median income was generally higher in the regional centers than the outlying communities. In 2015, 13 NWT communities had a median household income less than the Canadian median of \$70,336 (Chart 3).




