- 2007 Family Violence Survey - Methodology and Overview of Results

The NWT Bureau of Statistics, on behalf of the GNWT Department of the Executive and the Coalition Against Family Violence, conducted a Family Violence survey. A joint committee composed of representatives from all groups designed the survey instrument.

The Survey was conducted between November 4th and December 2nd, 2007. A total of 753 surveys were completed either by phone or face-to-face. Phone interviews were conducted in Yellowknife, Inuvik, Hay River, Fort Smith and Norman Wells, while face-to-face interviews were conducted in all other selected communities.

Data from the survey was entered into a database developed by the NWT Bureau of Statistics. Manual and automatic checks were conducted to check for consistency and data entry errors. Data from the statistical file was weighted to reflect the estimated number of males and females for specific age categories and ethnic groups.

Results of the survey indicate the vast majority of respondents – 87.5% - stated they were either very worried or somewhat worried about family violence in their community. Results also show that perception of family violence can differ among men and women. 25.2% of men and 15.6% of women agreed physical violence between a couple is a private mater and should be dealt with within the family. Finally, 46.6% of total respondents think children under 12 years of age are most at risk for family violence.

Detailed results from the survey are presented in the following statistical tables. Each table represents a question from the survey and summarizes the overall results for that question. A paper copy of the questionnaire is provided after that section.
