# Monthly Labour Force Activity - April 2017-

#### **Overview**

In April 2017, there were 32,400 people aged 15 years or older in the Northwest Territories. Of these, 22,800 were working or actively looking for work. At 1,200, the number of unemployed persons reached its lowest since May 2009, while the unemployment rate decreased to 5.3%, the lowest since November 2010.


The employment rate was 66.7%, with 21,600 people employed in April 2017. Between May and April, the number of employed persons increased by 200, following an increase by 300 from the previous month. Almost all of the job gains were concentrated among males, Non-Aboriginal persons, and in full-time employment.

# **National highlights**

For Canada overall, the unemployment rate was 6.5% in April 2017, the lowest rate since October 2008.

The national employment rate dropped 0.4 percentage points to 60.5%. Among the provinces and territories, Yukon (72.7%) had the highest employment rate, followed by the Northwest Territories (66.7%), and Alberta (66.1%).



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


### **Employment by key demographic characteristics**

Compared to April 2016, there were 900 fewer people employed in the NWT. As a result, year-over-year, employment rates dropped across all key demographic characteristics. The employment rate among youths aged 15-24 saw the highest decline, falling to 40.4%, 5.4 percentage points from April last

year. The employment rate dipped 1.0 percentage points to 58.9% among those living outside of Yellowknife, the least drop among key characteristics.

Figure 3 compares the historical proportion of employed persons in Yellowknife and the rest of the territory. While the gap has narrowed over the years, Yellowknife still retains a higher proportion of employed persons.



#### Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

Except for self-employment, the number of employed persons decreased for all selected characteristics between April 2016 and April 2017 (Table 1).
