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Monthly Labour Force Activity – January 2018-

Overview

Labour Force Survey information released by Statistics Canada today estimates the Northwest Territories' labour force at 22,900 persons in January 2018. Of these, 20,900 were working, representing an employment rate of 64.5%. The employment rate was below historical rates for January, continuing a trend observed in the past twelve months of lower employment rates compared to previous years.

Employment levels declined by 200 persons between January 2017 and January 2018. Gains in part-time employment were off-set by losses in full-time positions.

Between December 2017 and January 2018, the number of people actively seeking employment in the Northwest Territories increased by 400. As a result unemployment increased to 2,000, while the number of persons not in the labour force declined in return.

National highlights

For Canada overall, the employment rate dropped slightly to 61.4% from the previous month. Among the provinces and territories, Yukon (72.5%) maintained the highest employment rate, followed by Alberta (66.6%) and the Northwest Territories (64.5%).


At 8.7%, the Northwest Territories' unemployment rate was the fourth highest after Newfoundland and Labrador (15.5%), Nunavut (13.8%), and Prince Edward Island (11.0%). The national unemployment rate was 5.7%.

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Employment by key demographic characteristics

While the overall employment rate for the Northwest Territories was little changed year-over-year, a closer look shows different patterns for each of the key demographic characteristics (Figure 1). Compared to January 2017, employment rates increased for youths aged 15-24 years, Non-Indigenous persons, and those living in Yellowknife. All other demographic categories had declines in the employment rate.





Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

Compared to January 2017, full-time employment decreased by 400, more than offsetting gains made in part-time employment. Over the same period, gains in private sector employment and self-employment were off-set by losses in public sector employment.

Year-over-year employment levels by industry were little changed. In the 12 months to January 2018, employment levels ranged between 3,000 and 4,200 persons in the goods-producing industry, while ranging between 17,400 and 18,400 persons in the services-producing industry.
