
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Labour Force Activity July 2021

The July 2021 employment rate in the Northwest Territories (NWT) was 72.0%, an increase from 69.9% recorded in the previous month. The labour force increased by 700 from June 2021 as more people entered the work force. The number of employed persons increased to 24,400, reaching employment levels last seen in August 2016. Among the employed, 86% worked full-time while 14% worked in part-time positions.



Compared to labour market conditions prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, the July 2021 employment rate was 1.9 percentage points higher than July 2019. Similarly, employment was up by 700 persons, driven solely by part-time employment.

On an annual basis, the labour force increased by 1,800, while employment increased by 3,000 persons compared to July 2020. The employment rate increased by 8.7 percentage points from 63.3% 12 months earlier.

Year-over-year, the number of unemployed persons declined from 2,300 to 1,100. As a result, the unemployment rate dropped from 9.7% in July 2020 to 4.3% in July 2021.

Employment by selected characteristics

Year-over-year, the number of employed persons increased by 3,000 resulting in higher July 2021 employment rates across all demographic characteristics. Employment increased by 2,100 in communities outside of Yellowknife, accounting for 70% of total increases. Youth aged 15 to 24 recorded the largest increase in the employment rate, rising by 23.1 percentage points from 43.6% in July 2020. The July 2021 youth employment rate of 66.7% is the record highest for this age group.


Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

At the industrial level, year-over-year employment increased by 10% in the goods-producing industry and by 15% in the services-producing industry. Employment increased in all sectors, by 1,400 in the public sector, 1,100 in the private sector and by 400 in self-employment.

National highlights

Among the provinces and territories, the Northwest Territories (72.0%) had the highest employment rate in July 2021, followed by Yukon (67.9%), Saskatchewan (61.7%) and Alberta (60.3%). Nova Scotia (54.4%), Newfoundland & Labrador (49.1%), and Nunavut (47.9%) had the lowest employment rates.
