

Monthly Labour Force Activity - June 2018-

Overview

In June 2018, the Northwest Territories' (NWT) labour force increased by 700 persons compared to the previous month. Overall employment increased by 2.4% or 500 persons, spurred by increases in full-time and youth employment. The employment rate rose to 65.8%, reaching levels slightly above June last year. June is the first month this year where employment rates were higher than 2017.

On an annual basis, employment was little changed and stood at 21,400, with gains in part-time work offset by a decline in full-time employment.

Over the same period, the number of people looking for work in the NWT increased by 600 persons. In response, the unemployment rate increased 2.3 percentage points compared to one year ago.

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


National highlights

Nationally, Canada's employment rate increased by 0.6 percentage points to 61.9% in June 2018.

Among the provinces and territories, the Northwest Territories (65.8%) had the third highest employment rate after Yukon (73.1%) and Alberta (67.5%). Newfoundland & Labrador (51.1%), Nunavut (53.7%) and New Brunswick (57.2%) had the lowest employment rates.

Employment by key demographic characteristics

Between June 2017 and June 2018, the number of employed persons increased among females, Non-Indigenous persons, and people living in Yellowknife. The employment rate increased the most among youths aged 15-24 years, rising by 3.4 percentage points in June 2018.

Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

Year-over-year, the employment increase of 1,100 in the public sector were offset by losses in the private sector (-200) and in self-employment (-700).

Employment in the services-producing industries increased by 1,000, while declining by 800 in the goods-producing industries.
