Monthly Labour Force Activity - June 2017-

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that in June 2017, 21,300 out of 32,400 residents 15 years of age and older were employed in the Northwest Territories, representing an employment rate of 65.7%. Between May and June 2017, employment rose by 200 persons.


Year-over-year, the employment rate fell by 4.5% percentage points. The NWT unemployment rate decreased from 8.0% in June 2016 to 6.27% in June 2017 with 600 fewer people seeking work. During the same period, the number of people not in labour force increased by 2,100 persons (27.6%).

National highlights

Nationally, the employment rate in Canada rose 0.8 percentage points to 61.9% in June 2017, while the unemployment rate dropped to 6.5%. Among the provinces and territories, Yukon (74.9%) had the highest employment rate, followed by Alberta (67.1%) and the Northwest Territories (65.7%) (Figure 1).

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Employment by key demographic characteristics

In June 2017, there were 1,600 fewer people employed in the NWT compared to the same month last year. The decline in the number of employed persons from June 2016 was highest amongst non-aboriginal persons and the rest of communities with decreases of 1,100 and 1,200 respectively in these demographics.




Figure 2: Change in employment rates from 12 months ago - NWT, June 2017

In terms of year-over-year employment rates, declines occurred across all key demographic characteristics (Figure 2). Youths aged 15-24 had the highest decline, followed by those living in the rest of the territories.

Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

The number of employed persons decreased for public and private sector between June 2016 and June 2017, and increased for self-employment (Table 2).
