Monthly Labour Force Activity - March 2018-

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that in March 2018, out of 32,400 residents 15 years of age and older 20,700 persons were employed in the Northwest Territories (NWT), representing an employment rate of 63.9%. This is a slight drop from last month. Marginal gains in part-time employment were off-set by a drop in full-time employment as overall employment declined by 200 persons from February 2018.



On a year-over-year basis, employment dropped by 700 persons as a result of a decline in full-time employment. Similarly, the employment rate dropped by 2.1 percentage points over the same period.

Meanwhile, since the beginning of 2017, the number of persons not in the labour force has trended upwards, and stood at 9,700 in March 2018. Among those

not in the labour force last month, about 40% were aged 55 years and over.




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National highlights

The employment rate for Canada was 60.7% in March 2018. Despite the drop from the previous month, the NWT employment rate stayed the third highest in the country, after Yukon (71.9%) and Alberta (66.6%).

At 8.8%, the NWT unemployment rate was 1.8 percentage points higher than in March 2017. Jurisdictions with the highest unemployment rates were

Figure 2: Employment Rates, Provinces & Territories, March 2018




Newfoundland and Labrador (16.5%), Nunavut (12.6%), and Prince Edward Island (12.5%). Nationally, the unemployment rate was 6.2%.

Employment rates by selected demographic characteristics

Figure 3 compares employment rates by sex for the NWT and Canada over the past three years. Historical employment rates are constantly higher for males than females in Canada. In contrast, female employment in NWT rates the have occasionally surpassed male employment rates in recent years.

Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

Both the private sector (-400) and public sector (-300) industries experienced employment declines year over year. However, self-employment was unchanged from March 2017 with 1,500 persons working last month.

The goods-producing sector accounted for the bulk of employment declines (-600), year-over-year. On the other hand employment in the services-producing sector dropped by about 100 persons.
