Labour Force Activity

-May 2019-

Overview

The employment rate in the Northwest Territories (NWT) was 65.1% in May, a slight decline from 65.5% in April. The number of employed persons stood at 21,100, with about 90% working full-time and 10% working part-time.

Year-over-year, the employment rate increased by 0.8%. Over this period, there was a slight shift towards full-time employment with 400 more persons working full-time at the expense of part-time employment.

Compared to May 2018, different patterns can be observed in employment rates for key demographic characteristics. Employment rates increased for youth aged 15 to 24 and for males by 7.3 and 2.7 percentage points respectively, while employment rates decreased among those 25 years and older, females, Indigenous persons and those living in Yellowknife.

National highlights

Nationally, Canada's employment rate increased from the previous month to 61.8% in May 2019. The Northwest Territories (65.1%) had the third highest employment rate after Yukon (73.4%) and Alberta (66.6%). Saskatchewan had the fourth highest employment rate (64.9%).




Figure 1: Employment Rates, Provinces & Territories, May 2019

At 7.9%, the Northwest Territories' unemployment rate was fifth highest in the country, with Newfoundland & Labrador (12.8%), Nunavut (12.4%) and Prince Edward Island (10.4%), having the highest unemployment rates. The national unemployment rate was 5.9%.

Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

At the industrial level, the goods-producing industry accounted for all of the year-over-year job gains, with construction experiencing the largest increase. Meanwhile, the services-producing industry decreased by 300 people between May 2018 and May 2019. Over the same period, employment gains in private sector and self-employment were offset by losses in public sector employment.
