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
# Labour Force Activity

## May 2020

The employment rate in May was 62.2%, making it the lowest since collection of labour force information for the Northwest Territories (NWT) began in 2001. While the number of employed persons was unchanged from the previous month, at 20,200, there were 900 fewer compared to May 2019. This labour force status release is the third since the beginning of COVID-19 related interventions and business closures, and sheds more light on the impact of the pandemic on the NWT labour market.

The number of persons not in the labour force increased by 800 between March and May 2020, potentially indicating the reduction in people looking for employment due to COVID-19 related business closures. Figure 1 shows that the drop in the unemployment rate in April and May 2020 was more likely a result of people leaving the labour force than finding employment.





#### At the industrial level, year-

over-year employment declined the most in the services-producing sector, dropping by 800 in the information, culture & recreation sub-sector, followed by health care & social assistance (-400), transportation & warehousing (-300), and finance, insurance, real estate & leasing (-300).

### Employment rates by selected characteristics





Figure 2: Employment Rate Changes, by Selected Characteristics, May 2019 & May 2020

Compared to 12 months ago, employment rates dropped among all major worker groups, decreasing the most among youths aged 15-24 years, females, and Non-Indigenous persons. The drop in the employment rate from 46.2% to 31.4% among youths aged 15-24 years may reflect low employment levels of summer students this year (Figure 2).

#### National highlights

Nationally, the employment rate dropped 2.5 percentage points to 54.1% between April and May 2020. Employment rates dropped for all provinces and territories with Nunavut, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia experiencing the biggest drop. Unemployment rates were highest in Nunavut (16.6%), Newfoundland and Labrador (12.8%), and Prince Edward Island (10.4%).

#### Supplementary Indicators - Canada

Figure 3 compares two supplementary indicators developed to measure the effects COVID-19 on work patterns among Canadian workers. The number of employed persons who were absent from work all week increased from 565,500 in February, peaking at 2,805,000 in April. Last month saw a slight decline in this category of workers. Similarly, the number of employed persons and absent 50% or more of their usual work hours increased in May following a drop in April.
