


Monthly Labour Force Activity – November 2017-

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that in November 2017, 21,300 out of 32,400 residents 15 years of age and older were employed in the Northwest Territories. Employment dropped by 500 persons from the previous month, all losses concentrated in full-time employment while part-time employment recorded marginal gains. Similarly, the employment rate dropped 1.6 percentage points from the previous month to 65.7% in November.



On an annual basis, employment in the Northwest Territories decreased by 3.6% or 800 persons. The employment rate dropped 2.3 percentage points from 12 months ago, and was the lowest for the month of November since 2010.


At 1,500, the number of unemployed persons was little changed year-over-year. The drop in the unemployment rate to 6.6% was a result of more people leaving the labour force.



Figure 2 shows employment rates and persons not in the labour force over the past 24 months. After peaking in August 2016, the employment rate has stayed below 71% since then.

In November 2017, there were 9,600 persons not in the labour. Of these, 82% (7,900) were either youths aged 15-24 or seniors aged 65 years and older.


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National highlights

Nationally, Canada's employment rate dropped slightly from the previous month to 61.8% in November 2017.

Among the provinces and territories, the Northwest Territories (65.7%) had the third highest employment rate after Yukon (73.0%) and Alberta (66.7%). Newfoundland & Labrador (50.8%), Nunavut (54.9%) and Nova Scotia (56.9%) had the lowest employment rates. Figure 3: Employment Rates, Provinces & Territories, November 2017



Employment by key demographic characteristics

Between November 2016 and November 2017, employment dropped for all key demographic characteristic, except for persons aged 15-24 and those living in Yellowknife. Similarly, employment rates dropped for all, except youths aged 15-24 years.

Employment by employment type, class of worker, and industry

Year-over-year, employment in the private sector and self-employment increased for a combined total of 700 persons. These employment gains were however offset by a drop of 1,400 in the public sector employment.

Employment dropped in both the goods-producing (-100) industries and the services-producing industries (-600).

Data presented for the Northwest Territories is based on three-month moving averages, with survey counts rounded to the nearest 100 persons.
