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
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Northwest Territories Population by Age and Gender July 2024

On July 1, 2024, Statistics Canada estimated that 44,731 people were living in the Northwest Territories, an increase of 50 people from one year ago. The components of natural increase over the one-year period consisted of 481 births and 326 deaths, resulting in a net increase of 155 persons. Interprovincial migration accounted for 1,468 persons moving into the Northwest Territories from other provinces and territories, while 2,248 persons moved away, representing a net loss of 780 persons. Internationally, there was a net in-migration of 675 persons.

Historically, the NWT has had a relatively young population; as of July 1, 2024 the median age in the territory was 36.0 years, compared to 40.3 for Canada. The territorial median age rose from 33.8 to 36.0 for men+¹ and from 33.4 to 36.0 for women+² between July 1, 2014 and July 1, 2024. Despite the young median age, the NWT population is aging as illustrated by the population pyramid in Figure 1. The number of NWT seniors (those aged 60 and older) increased by 60.5%, over the 10-year period.

Figure 2 Growth in Seniors from July 1, 2014 to July 1, 2024 Canada, Provinces and Territories




Figure 2 shows the growth in seniors in the provinces and territories. Between July 1, 2014 and July 1, 2024, Yukon had the highest growth in seniors (+61.9%), followed by NWT, Nunavut and Alberta. Saskatchewan (+30.0%) had the lowest growth in senior over the same period.

The proportion of seniors in the population varies across provinces and territories, ranging from 8.3% in Nunavut to 32.6% in Newfoundland and Labrador. At 17.2%, the NWT had the second lowest proportion of seniors as of July 1, 2024.

Overall, Canada's population increased by 3.0% between July 1, 2023 and July 1, 2024 (Table 1). Alberta experienced the largest increase followed by Ontario and British Columbia. In contrast, the NWT's growth rate was the lowest among the provinces and territories (0.1%).
