Consumer Price Index January 2021

COVID-19 has restricted the movement of people and forced many businesses to change their normal operations. This affected how Statistics Canada conducted the Consumer Price Index in January. Data collection was done remotely, supplemented by alternate data sources, and a higher level of data imputation occurred due to the reduced availability of some products and services.



Statistics Canada indicates that in January 2021 the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index fell by 0.9% compared to one year ago. By comparison, the January annual price change was 1.0% for Canada, 0.9% for Edmonton and 0.2% for both Whitehorse and Iqaluit.

Before the pandemic, the Yellowknife CPI was trending upward but a decline in prices during the spring of 2020 reversed much of the previous year's increase. Despite monthly fluctuations since then, prices have generally remained below pre-pandemic levels, resulting in numerous annual price declines in Yellowknife over the previous 12 months.

Between January 2020 and January 2021, Yellowknife consumer prices decreased in six of the eight major components. Clothing and footwear declined the most,





falling by 5.8% over the previous 12 months. Shelter contributed to the overall decline, largely a result of the 8.7% decrease in water, fuel and electricity.

Fuel oil & other fuels fell 22.3% between January 2020 and January 2021 while electricity prices remained the same over this period. Gasoline declined by 6.4% resulting in an overall decrease of 10% in energy prices.
