Consumer Price Index

July 2022

Information released today by Statistics Canada indicates the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index in July rose by 8.0% compared to one year ago. By comparison, annual prices increased by 7.6% for Canada, 7.6% for Edmonton, 7.7% for Whitehorse and 5.2% for Iqaluit.



Consumer prices increased in all provinces between July 2021 and July 2022. Newfoundland & Labrador had the lowest increase (6.9%), while Prince Edward Island had the highest (9.5%).


Between July 2021 and July 2022, Yellowknife consumer prices rose in all eight major components. Transportation experienced the highest increase, rising by 14.8% due to higher prices for both private transportation and public transportation (airline travel). Shelter also increased over the 12-month period due to higher prices for water, fuel and electricity.

After declining during the first half of 2021, food prices have been trending upwards since July of last year, increasing by 8.0% over the last 12 months.
