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Consumer Price Index June 2026

Information released today by Statistics Canada indicates the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index in June rose by 3.4% compared to one year ago. By comparison, annual prices increased by 2.8% for Canada, 3.2% for Edmonton, 5.7% for Whitehorse, and 2.8% for Iqaluit.

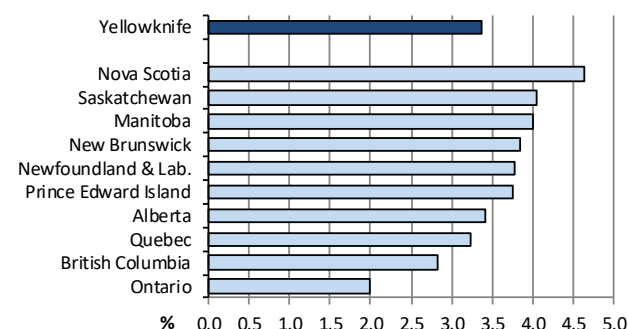
Consumer prices increased for all provinces between June 2025 and June 2026. Ontario had the lowest increase (2.0%) while Nova Scotia had the highest (4.7%).

Between June 2025 and June 2026, Yellowknife consumer prices rose in all eight major components. Transportation increased by 7.7%, driven by higher costs for both public and private transportation, including gasoline. Shelter increased by 3.8% over the 12-month period, a result of higher prices for water, fuel and electricity.

Fuel oil & other fuels rose 20.6% between June 2025 and June 2026 while electricity decreased by 0.2% over this period. Gasoline rose by 26.2% resulting in an overall increase of 11.6% in energy prices.

The increase in energy prices was not unique to Yellowknife as all jurisdictions experienced double-digit growth between June 2025 and June 2026.

June 2025 to June 2026**

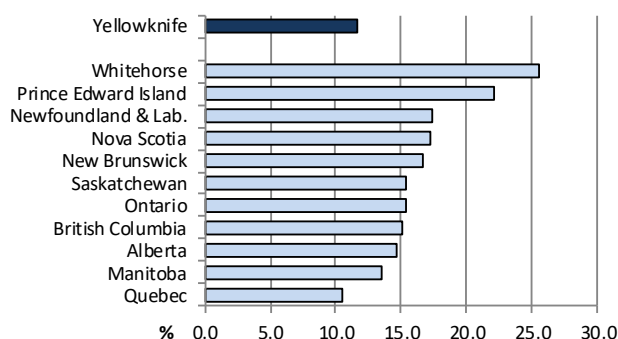
