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Consumer Price Index - May 2018 -


Information released today by Statistics Canada indicates that the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index in May rose by 1.9% compared to one year ago. By comparison, the annual price increase was 2.2% for Canada, 2.7% for Edmonton, 2.2% for Whitehorse and 2.6% for Iqaluit.

Compared to May 2017, shelter experienced the largest increase, rising by 4.0% over the last 12 months. Part of the increase in shelter is attributed to the 7.4% increase in water, fuel and electricity. Transportation also rose between May 2017 and May 2018, mostly a result of higher prices for public transportation which includes airline travel.





Looking at energy and its components, fuel oil and other fuels increased by 20.5% while gasoline rose 16.9%. The increase in gasoline was not unique to Yellowknife as all jurisdictions experienced a large increase between May 2017 and May 2018.
