



Consumer Price Index November 2022

Information released today by Statistics Canada indicates the Yellowknife All-Items Consumer Price Index in November rose by 7.8% compared to one year ago. By comparison, annual prices increased by 6.8% for Canada, 6.3% for Edmonton, 8.3% for Whitehorse and 4.3% for Iqaluit.

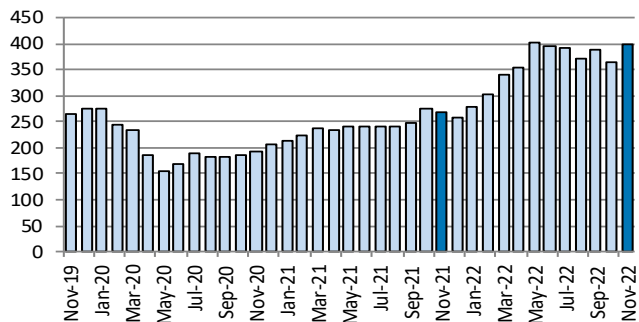
Consumer prices increased in all provinces and territorial capitals between November 2021 and November 2022. Ontario had the lowest increase (6.4%), while Prince Edward Island had the highest (9.7%).

Compared to one year ago, fuel oil and other fuels rose by 49.5% compared to 13.9% for gasoline. While gasoline prices have increased during the same period, they are down from their peak in June 2022.

Between November 2021 and November 2022, Yellowknife consumer prices rose in all eight major components. Food experienced the largest increase of 10.2% followed by shelter and transportation, both rising by 9.5% over the 12-month period.

The rise in food was largely a result of the 11.4% increase in food from stores. Bakery & cereal products experienced the largest increase of 17.6%, followed by vegetables (17.3%) and fruit & nuts (15.4%).

Yellowknife, November 2021 to November 2022**

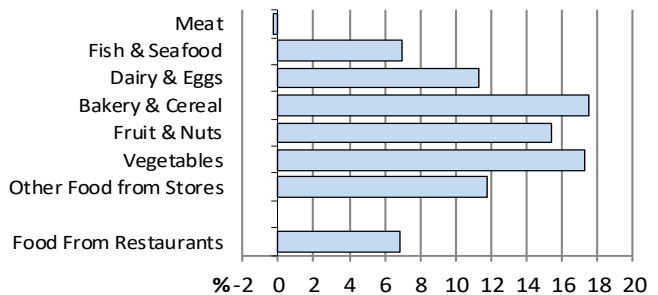
